STATUE WARS



The removal of two statues from the underwater Atlantic Museum in Playa Blanca has been condemned by diving schools, but it's just the latest episode in a long tale of political rivalry involving public artworks.

In 2013, the VII Lanzarote Biennial was launched in Playa Blanca by the then-Cabildo President Pedro San Ginés. Sponsored by the German art dealer Helge Achenbach, it was at this event that a proposal for an underwater museum by British artist Jason de Caires Taylor was first made.

Taylor soon took up residency at a studio in the Marina Rubicón, working with scores of Lanzarote residents who turned up to be cast in fibre-glass. These casts would later be the basis of the 300 concrete statues that would be placed on the seabed as part of the museum.

The Atlantic Museum opened in 2017 to worldwide coverage. Hailed as the first museum of its kind in Europe, it was quickly included on the list of the island's official CACTs (Cultural, Artistic and Tourist Centres) which, up to then, had been entirely composed of César Manrique projects.

However, behind the scenes there had already been strong objections to the project. The statues were later removed under cover of darkness, and were later confirmed to be images of the lawyer Ignacio Calatayud, an associate of ex-President San Ginés. Both men are currently being investigated on corruption charges. Meanwhile, the César Manrique Foundation maintained silence on the issue - a silence that left most observers in no doubt as to their stance.

In 2019, the Coalición Canaria were voted out of the Cabildo and replaced by a coalition led by Socialist María Dolores Corujo. One of her first acts as President was to remove the museum from the list of CACTs, a decision that was justified by the fact that it was attracting just 22 divers a day and making heavy losses. Since then, the museum has remained a regular excursion for dive schools, although it is no longer publicised officially, and costs the island nothing.

On 26th November, divers managed to turn back a boat chartered by the Cabildo that had been sent to remove two statues from the museum. The statues were later removed under cover of darkness, and were confirmed to be images of the lawyer Ignacio Calatayud, an associate of ex-President San Ginés, who is currently being investigated on corruption

Dive schools fear that this is the start of a "progressive dismantling "of the museum. Whether that is the case, or whether it is a bizarre instance of a political vendetta against San Ginés and his party, remains to be seen.

THE RISING TIDE

In 2016, the Cabildo installed four statues of horses made by Jason de Caires at the foot of the Castillo de San José in Arrecife. The works as a whole were titled The Rising Tide, intended to be covered and revealed by the tide twice a day, and had previously appeared at an art festival in London.


The exhibition was described as "temporary" at that time, and in 2019, the new Cabildo removed the horses, despite a campaign to keep them there. According to President Corujo, they had been removed to "return the identity of César Manrique" to the castle. Following the removals, Jason de Caires Taylor accused the Cabildo of "censorship".

The horses remain in a depot in Arrecife, their future uncertain.











LOCAL NEWS

SPECTACULAR SUNSET

Social media filled up with astonishing images of one of the most spectacular sunsets Lanzarote has experienced recently - a sight that many described as the "lava sky".

The late November mackerel clouds were caused by high altitude atmospheric waves, and as the sun descended they were lit up from behind with fiery red and orange colours.



WINDFARM FOR LAS CALETAS



A Spanish electricity firm has requested permission to place a wind farm off the shore of Arrecife.

The offshore wind farm proposed by Capital Energy would be composed of four windmills and produce 50 megawatts. Another wind farm of the same size and potential has already been requested by a Portuguese company in the same location.

The turbines would be located around three kilometres off the shore of Las Caletas, where the island's power station is located. As well as proximity to the power station, water depth and wind frequency are the reasons chosen for this location.

The company points out that, on the Canaries, the majority of power is still being provided by fossil fuels, and says that the price of fuel production on the islands is more than three times that on the mainland - a cost that must be shared by all Spaniards.

TEN TONS OF TOPS

10,000 kilogrammes of plastic bottle tops have been collected by Lanzarote schoolchildren last year, and will go towards helping children with special needs.

Hugo Delgado, councillor of the waste disposal at the Cabildo, announced that the tapones solidarios (supportive bottletops) campaign had been a great success, and announced that proceeds from the bottletops would go towards treatment for young Gabriel Padilla, who is suffering from cerebral paralysis; as well as towards a wheelchair for a girl called Sofía.

METEORITE LANDS

The Canarian Astrophysics Institute (ICA) has said that a meteorite that passed over Gran Canaria before falling into the sea is the first to be recorded in the Canaries.

In early December, people on Gran Canaria heard a thundering sound that may at first thought was an earthquake. However, later seismologists reported that there had been no tremors, and witnesses reported seeing a "reddish-green" light in the sky.

The ICA has stated that it believes the object was a meteorite measuring between 50 cms and a metre in diameter, and that it fell into the sea north of the Canaries. If confirmed it will be the first meteorite to be reported landing in Canarian territory.

Coincidentally, on the same night Ramón López, an astronomer in Playa Blanca, took photos of a rare double meteorite passing over the islands.



NEW PRIMARY SCHOOL FOR SAN BARTOLOMÉ

San Bartolomé Mayor, Isidro Pérez, and the Canarian Education Minister, Manuela Armas, have signed off the agreement to build a new primary school in San Bartolomé.

The new school will cost €8 million and be named the Centro de Educación Infantil y Primaria (CEIP) Alcalde Alexis Tejera Lemes, in honour of the young mayor who died of a degenerative illness last year. It will take the place of the current provisional primary school facilities in the Casa Ajei.



YAIZA BELÉN THEFT



The theft of five camels and a shepherd from Yaiza's famous nativity scene was condemned by

the local Councillor for Culture, Daniel Medina, last month.

"It's a prank in extremely bad taste," he said, "Not just because of the loss, but because of the work the creators have put into the Belén".

Medina also revealed that two other people had been stopped by the police after taking material from the scene while it was being prepared. He promised that cameras would be installed shortly to deter further thefts.

WORLD CUP JOY AND HEARTACHE

The Qatar World Cup brought joy and heartbreak for thousands of tourists and residents on Lanzarote.

There was disappointment for German fans as

their team crashed out in the group stages, but joy for Moroccans as their team progressed to the semi-finals for the first time.

English fans once again lamented a missed penalty as Gareth Southgate's impressive side lost narrowly to France in the quarter finals.



ISLAND INFO

REGISTER TO VOTE



A reminder that, if you wish to vote in the municipal elections in May this year, you'll need to make sure that you are registered on the local padrón municipal (local electoral list before the 15th January.

According to the British Embassy, those who are eligible to vote in next May's municipal elections should now have received a letter from the Electoral Office (OCE). As a reminder, anyone who has been resident in Spain for more than three years is entitled to vote even if you have not received a letter, provided that you are registered on the padrón and confirm your registration on the electoral roll between 1 December 2022 and 15 January 2023.

The OCE letter will tell you what you need to do to confirm your registration on the electoral roll. In general, you can register online (using your cl@ve pin if you have one or the code provided in the letter) or you can fill in the form and send it back by post.

If have not yet received the letter, go to your local Town Hall (Ayuntamiento) with ID and check that you are registered.

It's a very quick process and shouldn't require an appointment.

CHRISTMAS ISN'T OVER!

Lanzarote celebrated Christmas in fine style last month as every town on the island mounted its Belén, or nativity scene; musicians strolled the streets playing festive tunes and Santa Claus arrived in various localities.

And, as everyone who lives here knows, it's not over. Belenes and Christmas decorations will remain up until at least the 6th January, while the Three Kings will travel around the island on the 5th Ianuary. See our What's On section for more details.



LANZAROTE ON VINYL

It's been a good few years since a vinyl record was issued on Lanzarote, but local group Ya -No Te Ouiero have just released their EP Latinoamérica on Malpais Records.

FREE BUS TRAVEL FOR REGULAR USERS

Free bus travel for frequent users is now in operation throughout the Canaries.

The free service only applies to regular users who holds bonos (travel cards), and the minimum total of journeys that can be made in a month is 15. If fewer journeys are registered, the user will have to pay normal prices when the card is renewed.

On Lanzarote, cards must be issued and renewed at the central bus station in Arrecife.

Canarian Transport Minister Sebastián Franquis justified the 15-journey limit by pointing out that the measures were intended to support workers and students, who make an average of 30 to 40 journeys a month.

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

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COUNTDOWN TO THE POLLS

In May this year, Lanzarote's strict rules on advertising will be suspended and the island will be decked with posters, banners, flags and other political advertising. This is all part of a democratic process that will dictate the next four years of policy in Lanzarote and the Canaries - the local elections on Sunday, May 28th.

Those posters and flags may get a second outing later in the year, as a General Election must take place in Spain before the end of November. But for the next five months, Lanzarote will be on campaign footing as local politicians fight to keep their jobs and to promote their vision for the island.

THE ELECTIONS

On May 28th, Spanish nationals in the Canaries will be able to vote for representatives in the Canarian Cabildo Parliament, the (island and for their local government) Ayuntamiento (municipal council).

EU nationals and British residents will be permitted to vote for their local municipal council only - (the Spanish government granted special dispensation for British voters following Brexit). There are three municipalities on Lanzarote where their votes could have a significant effect.

TÍAS

For the last four years, Tías has been ruled by a coalition led by Socialist Mayor José Juan Cruz. His main rival is expected to be Francisco Aparicio, the candidate for the conservative Popular Party (PP).

Cruz ruled Tías for several years before being ousted by the PP's Francisco Hernández in 2011. However, the PP's



involvement in corruption scandals national level and its support for oil drilling off Canarian coasts contributed to their defeat in 2019.

More than one in four Tías residents are from the UK or an EU country, meaning that their votes could be an important factor in the make-up of the council.

TEGUISE

Mayor Oswaldo Betancort of the Coalición Canaria has ruled Teguise with an absolute majority since 2019. An ambitious politician, he will step down and stand for the Cabildo Presidency this year. His colleague Olivia Duque will be the CC's



candidate for Mayor. Meanwhile, the CC's main rivals, the Socialists, led by mayoral candidate Marcos Bergaz, are mounting a strong campaign in the municipality.

YAIZA

Yaiza's Mayor, Óscar Noda, will stand once again for the UPY (Unidos Por Yaiza) party. On the evidence of previous elections his main challenge is likely to come from the Coalición Canaria.

Although there is no evidence that foreign residents have ever influenced elections in Yaiza, it is a municipality where just a couple of hundred votes can guarantee a seat on the council.



THE PARTIES

On Lanzarote, parties can be split between national organisations and regional ones.

Of the national parties, the Socialists (PSOE) have historically been strongest, followed by the conservative Partido Popular (PP).

Smaller parties, such as the centre-right Ciudadanos and the left-wing Podemos party, have been influential in forming coalitions, while the hard-right Vox party has so far failed to win any seats in any of the island's institutions.

Regional parties are devoted to gaining more power and representation for the islands, rather than independence. The strongest regional party is the Coalición Canaria (CC) which ruled the Canaries in various coalitions since the mid-90s before a Canarian-wide campaign by opposition parties removed them in 2019. While it's harder to classify regional parties, CC are now generally agreed to be on the centreright. Nueva Canarias is a centre-left regional party with a limited presence on Lanzarote, but which is influential at Canarian level.











HOW TO VOTE

If you wish to vote in the municipal elections in May, you must be registered on your local padrón (electoral roll). However, this does not guarantee your right to vote. To do so, you will need to register your intention to vote at your local Ayuntamiento, and you'll need to do it soon — the cut-off point in previous elections has usually been at the end of January.

Once you've registered, you should receive a voting card before the elections in May, and can vote at your local polling station with an ID card or passport.



The Secret of our Success

"A greater breadth of knowledge improves student's results"

It is with students between the ages of fourteen and fifteen, in the international IGCSE exams,


that the Hispano Británico in Puerto del Carmen shows its true teaching capacity.

Contrary to popular belief, children do not find it difficult to be taught more subjects than usual. On the other hand they find great delight in their own success.

Over the past 30 years the Hispano Británico has been gradually increasing the number of subjects offered at IGCSE and students are now taught a minimum of fifteen different subjects to be examined at that level. They will spend less time in lessons than they would in a school in Britain and they will study for fewer days in a year than in the UK. Nevertheless, their results will be outstanding.

If each exam grade is converted into a point score, where an A* has a value of 8 points and a G grade is given 1 point; when all the points are added and then divided by the number of students in the group, one can obtain the average individual point score of the group.

The first diagram (below) shows the improvement of the average points gained by our IGCSE students in six year periods over the past 30 years. Their average score has improved sixfold over this time and the average ability is now above 80 points, equivalent to ten A* grades.




An even greater effort is made with those that do not find it easy to study and the improvement of their results has been spectacular.

By insisting that all students should try their best at 15 IGCSE exams, (as the above diagram shows), the 25% of students with lower ability have

obtained on average 10 times better results that they obtained thirty years ago.

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1990-96 The Times published a four-page report on the work of the school. Two students of 13 years of age passed twelve subjects at GCSE.

1996-02 One of our students became the youngest Doctor ever to graduate in Veterinary Science.

2002-08 Cambridge Examinations



presented Rohit Aswani with an award for the highest Advanced Level results in Spain. Tuition and examination in 11 GCSE subjects became compulsory for all Year 11 students. Later, compulsory examinations in 14 subjects brought a four-fold improvement in overall results and a ten-fold improvement in the results of those with the greatest learning difficulties. The 800th centenary album of Cambridge University featured the Hispano Británico as one of ten outstanding international schools.

2008-14 A student from our school became the youngest Doctor of Medicine ever to graduate from a British university. Cambridge Examinations began to single out the highest mark in a subject obtained by a student, both at national and world level. In the following four years students at the Hispano Británico obtained sixteen national awards and on five occasions, the highest mark in the world was achieved. We became an official centre for the German national Goethe examinations.

2014-20 Five students obtained the highest GCSE results in the world. The Queen congratulated the school for its outstanding success. Students received from Cambridge Examinations a further twenty national awards and four world awards. We began pre-university laboratory practice with the extraction of DNA. Our promotion of young ladies in Science resulted in three ex-students studying post graduate courses at Cambridge, two becoming Doctors in Biology and a third reading Nuclear Physics. Kim Salen becomes the first student to pass exams in a total of eighteen different IGCSE subjects. We were authorised to offer courses that could lead to the provision of British university studies in Lanzarote.

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The Colegio Hispano Británico was founded in 1976.

It is the only accredited overseas British curriculum school (BSO) on Lanzarote. It is recognized centre for the University of Cambridge (CAIE), Pearson examinations and Trinity examinations. It is a UCAS centre for university entrance, an examinations centre for the Open University and the Goethe Institute. In 2014 the school was authorized by the British Government as a Centre for the instruction of teachers in their postgraduate year.

In 2020, authorization was obtained to offer BTEC qualifications up to 2nd year university level.

The school is quality assured by Ofsted (British DfE number: 141421).

PASSION IN Paradize

Canarian professor has written a book that analyses the role of the Canary Islands in British romantic fiction.

A HARLEQUIN ROMANCE **Margaret Mayo**



Few British novels are set on the Canary Islands, or so thought María Isabel González Cruz, a Professor of English Philology at the University of Las Palmas de Gran Canaria. She was investigating English-language literature about the islands when a colleague, Laura Vivanco, suggested she focus on the romantic novels published by Mills & Boon and Harlequin.

Produced in their millions, these cheap paperbacks were hugely popular among a mainly female readership, and were often translated into several languages. But they have always been looked down upon by literary critics, regarded as "trash" or "pulp" with no redeeming qualities.

Professor González unearthed more than 40 titles, dating from 1955 to 2004. "In many cases, the writers came here on holiday and were inspired to write about the islands," she says. Among them are Lanzarote-set romances by authors such as Sally Wentworth, Margaret Mayo and Lilian Peake.

Most of the novels involve a woman who arrives on the Canaries for work, or to visit family, and who falls in love with a Canarian, a Spaniard or a British man who lives on the islands. María Isabel shows how the books sometimes incorporate local legends and environmental themes, while some also refer to events such as the 1971 volcanic eruption in La Palma and the Tenerife air disaster of 1977. Local figures such as César Manrique also appear.

González also addresses the "paradise myth" present in the books - the islands are presented as beautiful, wild and exotic places - the perfect backdrop for wild romance, although this idealised image may not reflect the reality of Canarian life.

The professor admits that many of the novels, especially the earlier ones, contain errors, and that their quality varies: "Some are very good, and others are terrible."

Key Dates for

Financial Calendar



We trust you all had a lovely festive period and are looking forward to the New Year ahead. Let's hope some of the world's problems sort themselves out this year!

Given that we are at the very start of the year, we thought it was a timely opportunity to remind Spanish tax residents of their fiscal obligations throughout the year. Below are some key dates to look out for in the calendar.

Remember, the Spanish tax year runs in line with the normal calendar year, from 1st January to 31st December. This could be different to other countries systems; for example, the UK's, which runs from 6th April to the following 5th April.

Modelo 720 Declaration: This is a non-taxable Worldwide Asset declaration which needs to be completed by the 31st March 2022. Spanish tax residents should declare all overseas assets (outside of Spain) which have a value of 50,000€ or more. The value taken for each asset is calculated as per its value of 31st December the previous year and includes bank deposits, investments, and property.

"La Renta" Income Tax Return: This is the generic income tax return which most people will have experienced in the past. The income tax return has to be completed by the 30th June 2022 but is often done as early as May, allowing accountants to get ahead of the game. Spanish tax residents have an obligation to declare and pay tax on any Worldwide Income which is outside of any exemptions/ allowances. Each person has at least a 5,550€ personal allowance to offset against income, which rises depending on age and other factors.

Wealth Tax "Impuesto de Patrimonio"/ Solidarity Tax "Impuesto de solidaridad a las grandes fortunas": These taxes apply to both residents and non-residents alike but only



affects individuals with significant estates. Any tax liability starts after the personal allowance has been deducted; set at between 500.000€ and 700.000€ per person, depending on which autonomous region you live in within Spain. There are also additional allowances for main residences. The declaration for the Wealth tax has to be done at the same time as La Renta, i.e. by the 30th June 2022. The Solidarity Tax is new and is likely to be levied on the 31st December each year.

It may be that some (or all) of the above declarations are not applicable to you given your circumstances but if you have even the slightest doubt, we would strongly recommend that you check your position.

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2022 REVIEW



As 2022 shuffles off and 2023 bounds in, we take a look at some of the main issues and events that have defined Lanzarote in the last 12 months, as well as take a peek at what the year ahead has in store.

BACK TO NORMALITY

As the New Year came in, Spain was still under Covid restrictions that meant masks had to be worn in all public spaces indoors and outdoors.

That soon changed, as the outdoor rule was lifted in February and, in April, the indoor rules were restricted to public transport, chemists shops and public health buildings.

A hugely successful vaccination programme on the islands led to Covid figures being treated in the same way as flu, and combined with hometesting, this brought an end to compulsory quarantine rules.

As a result, 2022 was the first year since 2019 when several of the island's most popular events could go ahead once again. We saw the return of Arrecife En Vivo, Sonidos Líquidos and all the summer fiestas.

TOURISM RALLIES

Covid devastated the tourist trade for almost two years, but even before the lockdown there had been worries about the rise of competing destinations.



But as tourism opened up completely earlier this year, it became clear that the Canaries and Lanzarote had lost none of their charm and attraction. Tourists flocked back to the islands and by the end of the year figures were comfortably improving on the pre-lockdown situation.

PRICES ROCKET

The post-Covid global recovery led to a rise in inflation that was suddenly made much worse by Russia's invasion of the Ukraine, which led to an immediate increase in fuel prices.

In Spain, subsidies of 20 cents on every litre helped keep many on the roads, but everyone on Lanzarote has seen prices rise in supermarkets and shops.









WINE CHANGES

A better than expected grape harvest capped a year of experimentation and optimism in the wine sector. At El Grifo, the first "spring wine", made months earlier than the normal harvest in June, was declared a big success.

Transport costs are preventing many Lanzarote wine makers from promoting their products abroad so, for the time being, we've got it all to ourselves. Cheers!

CRIMES SOLVED & UNSOLVED

A firebug who confessed to setting hundreds of rubbish containers on fire was tracked down and arrested by police in October.

The arsonist cycled from his home in Playa Honda to Puerto del Carmen and Arrecife, where he started fires in containers. Any motives are still unknown.

Also in October, anger and frustration greeted the news that the elegant palmera inclinada (leaning palm) had been chopped down, removing one of the most photographed trees on the island for ever. No one has yet been charged with the act of destruction.

WEATHER WATCH

2022 was an exceptionally dry, hot year, and one of the main weather conditions noticed by



everyone was calimas. The dust storms were rarely heavy, but there was a constant haze on the horizon for much of the year.

Heavy rains washed things clean in September, and the island enjoyed a gloriously still and calm November.

NEW BUILDS

Several new projects were unveiled this year. They ranged from Arrecife's brand new Open Mall Shopping Centre and the Soco shopping Centre in Puerto del Carmen to a sports pitch in Costa Teguise.

New roundabouts popped up in Macher and Nazaret, and there'll be much more tarmacking going on before the elections in May.

LOOKING AHEAD

Last year was a great start, but 2023 promises to be the year when Lanzarote really returns to its old self.

The activity gets under way in February, as the island celebrates its carnival, over a month, starting at Arrecife on the 20th February and in Puerto del Carmen on the 25th.

It's already confirmed that March will see the hugely popular St Patrick's celebrations roaring back.

In May there's all sorts going on, with local and regional elections and man an Ironman race on the island, while elsewhere there's a Eurovision song contest in Liverpool and the coronation of King Charles III.

Summer fiestas and sporting events will return, and those election flags and posters will return at the end of the year, as Spain votes in a general election.

Lanzarote will also welcome big shopping names such as Primark, Mediamarkt and Aldi for the first time.

There'll be much, much more than that going on, though, and we'll be here to cover it all. Have a fantastic 2023!

DAVID'S DETOURS PUNTA MUJERES TO JAMEOS DEL AGUA



Tour guide David Penney leads a group along some of the islands prettiest and wildest coastline, shaped by the eruption of Volcán de la Corona 3,000 years ago.

> We parked on Calle la Cuesta, which is at the northern end of the Punta Mujeres, the seaside village just north of Arrieta with beautiful natural pools.

> But we'll look at those later. Now we're heading north on foot keeping the ocean on our right all the time.

> As soon as we leave the village we can see the malpais (badlands) of northern Lanzarote. They're given this name because farming is virtually impossible in this rocky region, but that doesn't mean that nothing grows - we immediately see the green covering of the tabaiba plant spread over the lava.

> We continue along a sandy track enjoying this unique landscape with its variety of amazing different colours - the dark brown lava rocks, the golden sand track, the fresh green vegetation, the contrasting blues of the sky







and ocean and the white banks of clouds high overhead.

This is an easy path to follow, as we just keep heading north.

After a short while out of the village, we came across about a dozen inflated innertubes, various items of clothing and some medication which appeared to be written in Arabic.

We were all of the opinion that these items were left behind earlier that morning or



through the middle of the night by some of the migrants who arrive on our remote coastlines. Rather than coming into the rocky shore with their boat, this group appear to have used the innertubes to save them from drowning.

Within the hour we come to the signposts which indicate the pretty paved path leading up to Jameos del Agua. The signs also remind you that the area is a protected zone and a conservation area.

A jameo is a volcanic tunnel, and the one

that includes the Cueva de los Verde and Jameos del Agua is one of the longest in the world, extending out into the ocean beneath our feet.

We decided to carry on past the turn-off to Jameos del Agua and continue exploring north for a wee while longer.

However, within a short space of time the terrain changes dramatically and the sandy track becomes a very rocky trail. You have to concentrate on each step as some of the lava rocks are razor sharp and you need to pay attention to where you are walking.

We decide that this has taken a lot of the enjoyment from the walk and choose to about turn and head back to the better conditions.

Once back on the sandy track, we stop for a juice break and a short rest before we make our way back along the path we trekked on the way up but this time keeping the ocean to our left side.

Before returning back to our cars we wandered around Punta Mujeres in search of a cold drink as our reward for the day.

Adopting CATS WITH FIV

DID YOU KNOW THAT AT LANZAROTE'S BIGGEST ANIMAL SANCTUARY THERE ARE A GROUP OF CATS WITH ONE THING IN COMMON? THEY ALL HAVE THE FELINE IMMUNODEFICIENCY VIRUS (FIV). DESPITE THIS, THEY ARE ALL ABSOLUTELY ADOPTABLE AND LOOKING FOR LOVING, SECURE HOMES.

A diagnosis of FIV can be a little scary, especially when people associate it with the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) and AIDS. However, cats with FIV can live long and healthy lives and there is absolutely no danger of passing the condition onto humans.

In fact, studies have shown that cats with FIV often live as long as otherwise healthy cats that do not have the virus. Many of these felines never show signs of FIV-related illness and age normally.

One of the FIV cats at SARA is Curry - a gorgeous, four-year-old ginger male. He was brought into the shelter after being found with extensive injuries to his face, including a smashed jaw and badly damaged eye.

After nursing by the dedicated staff and volunteers at SARA, he was well enough to join the other FIV cats at the shelter. They include Ulises, whose kittenish playfulness belies his age as a veritable abuelo at eleven-and-a-half years old. He and best friend Andresín - a characterful six-and-a-half-year-old - spend their days play-wrestling.

Another eight or so cats share the room with them. They are very well cared for but all would dearly love a home of their own.

FIV is commonly transmitted through cat bites. That means that cats with FIV should only be adopted by households with no other cats, or which already have other cats with the condition.

And there is another important recommendation. Although the disease is not easily transmittable, cats with FIV should not have access to the outdoors, in order to avoid contact with other felines. An exception can be made in the case of an enclosed patio or garden, but generally an FIV cat should be an indoor house cat.







Nevertheless, many people - especially those living in flats - have successfully adopted FIV cats and enjoyed a long and happy companionship with them.



Arehucas rum is distilled on Gran Canaria and is an essential element of any celebration. Other brands, such as Artemi and Cocal are also popular, but Arehucas is the oldest and the best-seller. It's available in dark and white varieties, of various vintages, and also makes the sweet, local favourite, honey rum.

TROPICAL / DORADA BEER

The huge rivalry between these two brands masks the fact that they're now both owned and brewed by the same company. However, Tropical's roots are in Gran Canaria, symbolised by a dog, while Dorada's are in Tenerife, with Mount Teide on every bottle.

There are other Canarian beers: Reina is a dry Pils that occupies third spot in sales, while Lanzarote now has three different local craft brewers: Nao in Arrecife, Malpeis in Tinajo and Los Aljibes in Tahiche.





CLIPPER DE FRESA

Clipper is the only major Canarian soft drink manufacturer, and has been operating since 1956 from Gran Canaria. It's drinks come in orange, lemon and apple flavour, but for some reason it's the strawberry version that has become a symbol of the islands and a homecoming favourite for young Canarians. In an online poll in 2020 the drink beat Fanta Naranja as "best soft drink in the world".



TIRMA AMBROSIA

These small chocolate wafer bars are regularly voted the favourite sweet snack on the islands, beating international contenders such as Kit-Kat. One of the reasons for their popularity is the fact that the Canarian airline Binter has given one to every passenger for several years.

FIRGAS MINERAL WATER

No mineral water has been produced on Lanzarote since the desalination plant stopped producing Chafaríz several years ago. Instead, Firgas is probably the most popular Canarian mineral water, bottled in the beautiful Gran Canarian village of Firgas, whose natural springs have been famed for over a century.

Pasta is as popular in Spain as it is everywhere else – a store cupboard staple that can be used for a satisfying meal at any time.

In Spanish supermarkets, all types of pasta are sold, from fine noodles to spaghetti and linguine; from lasagne sheets to shells and spirals. Look closely at most packets and you'll see a notice telling you how long the pasta should be cooked for.

There are endless arguments about whether to add a little oil to the water. Some believe it stops the pasta from sticking together, others say it prevents the water boiling over. It's up to you, though. Salt is, however, vital, and you can use up left-over stock for pasta, too.

When the pasta's done, strain and reserve a little of the cooking water, then return to the pan and stir in your sauce, adding some water if necessary.

Here are a couple of ideas for a fast and tasty pasta feast.

Sardines, capers, and parsley

- Two tins of sardines or sardinillas in olive oil
- Capers
- Bunch of parsley
- 1 or 2 fresh chillies

Chop capers, parsley and chillies. Mash sardines in a bowl with a fork and add other ingredients. Stir into cooked pasta and heat through. Serve with parsley leaves to garnish.

Add chopped, sun-dried tomatoes if you like.

Aglio e olio

- Extra virgin olive oil
- Butter
- Two cloves garlic
- · One bunch basil
- Grated parmesan cheese

Tear or chop the basil leaves. Heat the olive oil and butter in a small pan, then fry the garlic for just two minutes, making sure it doesn't burn. Stir into the pasta with the basil and serve piping hot, sprinkled with cheese.





















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NZAROTE

Chefs, wine-makers, bakers, farmers and other food producers all laid out their stalls last November for the island's biggest food fair – Cocinas Volcánicas.











The island's food fair, organised by Saborea Lanzarote, had become one of the island's most popular weekend outings before the pandemic; and despite controversy about its relocation from Teguise to Puerto del Carmen, it turned out to be a huge success once again.

No other Canary Island holds an event like this, and it has become central to Lanzarote's vision for a tourist future that places value on local food and produce, and the treasures that the island holds beyond the beaches and resorts.

For two days, food lovers could try €1 or €2 samples of food from several of the island's best restaurants; accompanied by local wines or craft beers. And the amount of inventive, beautifully -presented and mouth-watering dishes on display was hugely impressive.

In a separate tent, talks by cooks from Madeira and Indonesia, workshops on Canarian cheeses and cooking challenges involving La Santa's famous prawns were packed out.



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Playing with fire

The Missfits are three Lanzarote mums who want to bring the best of cabaret and burlesque to Lanzarote. We met up with them recently on the lovely seafront at Playa Honda.

The three Missfits are Michelle, Amy and George, three British women who have all arrived and made their lives on Lanzarote, and are raising families on the island.

They met each other while performing as dancers and singers in places like Rancho Texas, and a shared love of cabaret and burlesque, as well as tight friendship, led them to form The Missfits. They're supported at home by their partners, who they call the "Mr. Missfits", and who perform duties ranging from childcare and transport to security and photography.

Before the Covid pandemic hit, they were performing at Oceans in Matagorda, but the lockdown and a new baby for George has meant they've been a little quiet since. But it's clear that they're raring to get back on stage and doing what they love as a team.

All of them love burlesque, and the retro-styled versions of modern hits that are performed by the Post-Modern Jukebox company. Circus is another love, and they've headed over to mainland Spain to see Cirque du Soleil.

I'd heard about their antics with twirling fire sticks, and they explain that it's not all they do, but it's an exciting part of some routines. "But you don't actually do fireeating or flame-breathing?" I ask.

"Yes!" they cry. Michelle even rolls down her sleeve to show me the burn scars she's suffered from the flames. George admits that, as the main singer, she doesn't get involved as much with the fiery stuff as the dancers.

They love musicals, and think this is an area where Lanzarote is lacking. "We don't want to go out and do Sweet Caroline again," they say. "We've performed songs from Moulin Rouge and Chicago, and they've gone down brilliantly."

A Sister Act tribute, in full nun costume, is one of their favourite routines.

The Missfits also love performing with other acts on the island, and last year put on a 20s-themed Great Gatsby



show with sax hero Jake Hanson (who Michelle admits to having once babysat a few years ago when he was a boy!).

Shows such as the ones The Missfits stage on don't happen overnight. They tell me that , when one of them gets an idea, they get in touch with each other and start a new book – then show me one of the books in question, a notepad full of notes and ideas.

"People don't realise how much work is involved," says Amy. "Every show needs planning, you have to learn the words, choreograph the routines, rehearse everything over and over, and prepare the costumes."

All three light up at the mention of costumes. "We love it," says Amy "The sparkles, the glamour, the sequins, the rhinestones..."

"All fire-resistant, of course," adds Michelle.

"So what's the dream then?" I ask, and their answer is unanimous. "We'd love to have a regular venue and work as residents there, alongside other performers." It's a dream that would allow them to do what they really want to do, together, as friends and companions. And it's a flame that they will not allow to go out.

Lanzarote's Museo
Aeronáutico (Airport
Museum) is passed by
thousands of cars daily, but
only a few end up exploring
this fascinating place.
That's a shame, because it's
a little gem – a step back in
time to Lanzarote's earliest
days as an air destination.

The building in which the museum is located was actually the first airport on Lanzarote, which operated from 1946 until 1970, when increased traffic meant a move to what is now Terminal 2. It's a small but attractive building, with a circular control tower overlooking what used to be the runway.

This original airport gives a strong sense of what flying must have been like back in the old days when only a handful of planes arrived each week.

Inside, you can find all sorts of mementos and souvenirs of Lanzarote's early years of aviation. There are photos of visits by Concorde, vintage uniforms worn by flight staff, accounts of early hydrofoil landings in the waters off Lanzarote and a fearsome case of weapons and contraband that were once confiscated.





You can also see a replica of the original mural that César Manrique created for the airport, as well as another mural by the Belgian artist Jean-Pierre Hock. One of the most charming exhibits is the original bar where passengers and flight staff might share a drink or a snack before and after take-off , and you can also head upstairs to look at the control tower itself, with all the instruments and charts that were necessary in the days before GPS location and modern computers.

The Museo Aeronáutico is well-signposted as you enter the airport, with plenty of parking available and helpful assistants on hand. It's open from 10 am to 2 pm each day, and admittance is free of charge.



Centres of Art. Culture and Tourism

Mirador del Río

Manrique's spectacular viewpoint set into the Famara cliffs looks out over La Graciosa and the rest of the islands of the Chinijo Archipelago.

Cueva de los Verdes

The oldest of Lanzarote's tourist centres is a marvelously lit tour through a volcanic cave system. The optical illusion towards the end is genuinely stunning.

Jameos del Agua

Manrique's space age party venue is located in a lava bubble, where a legendary lake filled with unique blind crabs is flanked by restaurants, cafés, a volcano museum and a natural concert auditorium.

MIAC: Castillo de San Juan

This 250-year old fortress overlooks Arrecife's commercial port and is home to an art gallery featuring works by Picasso, Tapies, Miró and other modern artists. With a famous restaurant and attractive gardens, it's a glimpse of the island's past and future.

Cactus Garden

Manrique's favourite of his creations, this charming garden features over 1,400 different types of cactus and is set in a disused quarry in the heart of Lanzarote's cochineal country. A traditional windmill overlooks the scene.

La Casa Amarilla

The "yellow house", located at the foot of Arrecife's main shopping street, is the old seat of the island's government, and is now an art gallery and information centre.

Timanfaya: The Fire Mountains

Lanzarote's most popular outing offers a pure, breathtaking spectacle at one of the newest landscapes in the world. Take an unforgettable coach trip through the volcanoes and see the power and heat of the earth's inner crust.

Casa-Museo del Campesino

This complex of buildings in the very centre of Lanzarote is overlooked by Manrique's 15m high monument to the Farm Worker. Visitors can buy unique souvenirs, see exhibitions and take part in traditional activities.

Other outings

Museo Agrícola El Patio

Step back in time at this charming and fascinating farm museum on one of Lanzarote's largest estates. Clucking chickens, windmills, living history and a gorgeous location.

Museo del Timple, **Teguise**

The timple museum is devoted to the small guitar that is the sound of Canarian folk music, but you'll also be amazed by the Palacio Spinola, the island's grandest colonial home.

Mancha Blanca Volcano **Visitors Centre**

Often overlooked by visitors, this terrific little museum will teach you all you need to know about Lanzarote's dramatic volcano country.

César Manrique Foundation, Tahiche

Built in a lava bubble, Manrique's first island home is utterly fascinating. Solid lava flows into a lounge, trees grow out of underground caves, magnificent gardens flourish at every turn and the whole creation is inspirational.

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

Casa-Museo César Manrique, Haría

Manrique's second home in Haría has been recreated as if the artist had never left us, and gives us a glimpse of the man behind the legend. See his living room, his wardrobe, his record collection and visit the studio where he created many of his works.

Aeronautical Museum, **Lanzarote Airport**

Set in the island's first terminal building, this great little museum gives you a glimpse of bygone days when one plane a week landed here.

LagOmar, Nazaret

Built by Manrique's associate, Jesús Soto, LagOmar is an amazing gallery, museum and restaurant set in a mountainside. It's a magical, unforgettable place.

Pirate Museum, Teguise

Located in a hilltop castle where locals used to hide from raiding pirates, this museum revisits the island's lawless and often tragic past.

Museo Tanit, San Bartolomé

A lovely little museum that offers a fascinating glimpse of bygone Lanzarote and the tough, resilient and gloriously creative islanders who lived there.

Close up on: La Ermita de Las Nieves

The Ermita de las Nieves is the highest traditional building on Lanzarote, a wild and beautiful place where all of Lanzarote's glory is laid out in front of you.



The church sits on the Famara clifftop, and you can drive up there via Teguise and Los Valles, or approach in the other direction from Haría.


Upon arrival you'll be left to your own devices with incredible views of the island and the solitary La Ermita de Las Nieves church. It's a strange and beautiful landscape with stunning views, hovering kestrels, purple

thistles and prickly pear cacti.

In August, pilgrims from all over Lanzarote ascend to pay tribute and see La Virgen de las Nieves "Our Lady of the Snows.".

The celebrations don't last long. The Virgin is displayed at the doors of the church for one last time before being returned to the altar for another year.

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
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






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

FOREIGN BUYERS UNDER THE MICROSCOPE

The Nueva Canarias (NC) party has called for a commission to assess the impact of foreign buyers on the property market. The result of such a commission could theoretically see the introduction of restrictions on foreign property buyers.

NC is a centre-left regionalist party whose main support comes from Gran Canaria and Tenerife. However, it has been a member of the



Socialist-led coalition that has ruled the islands for the last four years and could play a critical role in forming the next government this year.

The main parties in Spain have so far resisted any moves on limiting foreign buyers, which could also run into difficulties with EU directives that guarantee foreign buyers the same rights as locals.

Spain's land registrars' association has revealed that foreigners were responsible for 34% of home purchases in the Canaries in the third quarter of 2022 - the highest region in Spain. Similar figures have been issued by the Spanish government.

HOUSING FOR HOTEL STAFF "IMPOSSIBLE"



Canarian hotel owners have complained that the lack of affordable housing is making it impossible for them to find staff to work for them.

According to Jorge Marichal, president of hoteliers federation Ashotel, there are three reasons for the lack of housing: "Failure to build public housing; housing projects sold to vulture funds by promoters following the 2008 crisis, and a move from residential lets to tourist lets."

"We're finding it increasingly difficult to hold on to qualified staff because of the price of housing," said Marichal, "and it's

making it difficult to attract people from outside. Housing on the Canaries is becoming impossible."

POSITIVE SIGNS FOR SPAIN

As the year turns, Spain's inflation rate appeared to be falling as the year came to an end.

In November, Spain's inflation rate was 6.8%, a fall of 0.5% on the previous month and much lower than the overall Eurozone rate of 10% and the UK's 11.1%rate. The main driver behind this fall was energy prices, which are strongly related to the methods for calculating inflation in Spain.

That method meant a huge rise in inflation earlier in the year, following energy price increases after Russia's invasion of the Ukraine, but those prices have since been falling.

Other good news for the economy include a resilient labour market and, on the Canaries, a strong winter tourist season.



WEALTH TAX FOR SPAIN

Spain is likely to introduce a new wealth tax on the richest in society in 2023. The "Solidarity Tax" is forecast to raise almost 3.2 billion Euros.



The tax will apply to all "High Net Worth Individuals" with assets worth more than 3 million Euros, and will be applied in three bands. A 1.7% tax on assets valued between €3 and €5 million, 2.1% for €5 to €10 million and 3.5% for assets worth more than €10 million.

Spanish residents will be expected to pay the tax on all assets held inside and outside of Spain (in the absence of double-tax agreements). Non -residents will only pay tax on assets in Spain.

Although the tax has been pencilled in for declarations in 2023 and 2024, it could be extended beyond those dates.

CHEAPER TO BUY THAN RENT

Despite rising interest rates, the soaring cost of rented accommodation means that it is still currently cheaper to pay a mortgage than rent in the Canaries.

According to local mortgage broker Hypoo, the average Canarian will pay €218 less each month on a mortgage than they would on rent for a similar property.

However, further increases in interest rates could change that - although there seems no immediate solution to the shocking lack of rental accommodation on the islands, and the resulting high rents, either.









Fireplaces and carpets

You'll look very hard on the Canaries before you find a fireplace with a hearth and a roaring fire. That's because it simply isn't required, and never has been. That also means that mantelpieces are fairly unknown here.

Carpets are also rare. That's because there's no need for their insulating qualities and the fact that dust is the main cleaning problem in the Canaries. Carpets are often regarded as unhygienic and Spanish families tend to use easily cleanable rugs or wear house shoes indoors.

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Plugs

UK plugs are generally thought to be safer than European two-pin plugs, but electrocution statistics don't seem to reflect any advantage. UK plugs have insulated prongs, shuttered sockets and inbuilt fuses, while the two-pin Spanish types tend to have sunken sockets. It's a lot easier to yank a Spanish plug out than a UK one, but if you step on a plug in bare feet or socks, you'll be glad if it's a Spanish one.

Windows, and shutters

Spanish windows tend to open inwards. That's because shutters are widely used to control heat and sunshine, as well as to add extra security. You won't be able to put much on your windowsill, though.

Kitchens

Most Spanish homes don't have kettles because they don't drink a dozen cups of tea a day. What they do have is extractor hoods, due to the popularity of fried foods.

Spanish kitchens often have two sinks - one for washing and one for rinsing and leaving to dry. A drying rack may also be used. The British practice of wiping soapy dishes dry with a cloth horrifies Spaniards.

Mixer Taps

In the UK, cold water comes from the mains and hot water from a tank in the home. Safety laws once meant that taps were separated to ensure people drank from the cold tap, avoiding possible contamination from the tank. In Spain, no such laws existed and mixer taps are standard.

Rubbish

You won't have your own wheelie bins in Spain. Rubbish goes directly into the containers in the street and is collected almost every day, rather than once a week or less. It's a necessary service in a hot climate.



LEAN STAR



The idea of spring cleaning comes from colder northern countries, where winters are too cold and wet to air the house. But on an island where it's warm all year round, you can spring clean whenever you want, and New Year is a great time to give your Lanzarote home a good old clean out.

Dustbusting

Dust is the cleaner's main problem on Lanzarote, and last year saw plenty of the stuff. It'll get in somehow or other, and you'll need to establish a routine.

For floors, a vacuum cleaner is essential to hoover up the dust rather than just redistribute it around the house, but you'll also find a dust mop very useful, and a final pass with a wet mop will leave things perfect.

Before you do the floor, though, use a feather duster and damp cloths on higher surfaces. Always work from top to bottom.

Check doors and make sure dust guards are well-fitted.

White washing

January's a good time to give white walls a good clean, exterior walls a hose down or even fetch the paint out for a touch-up.

The good thing about white is that it's easy to match with new paint, but it's still a good idea to buy a big tin and decant some into smaller containers for those regular touch-ups.

When cleaning, pay special attention to areas that get grubby - around light switches, for example. Use a sponge or a pencil rubber to get rid of stubborn stains.

Pure chemistry

Vinegar and bicarbonate of soda, cleaning alcohol and agua oxigenada (hydrogen peroxide) are part of every Spanish home-owners kit, with hundreds of uses around the house. Just make sure they're not going to do any damage before you use them (hydrogen peroxide is a bleach).

Spanish cleaning products have become highly fashionable in the UK in recent years, beloved for their fragrances and effectiveness. It's worth experimenting with the products in your local supermarket.

Chitter out

Decluttering is also a great idea after the Christmas holidays. You'll be taking down your decorations anyway, so why not carry on and make the job a good 'un? New Year is a time for taking off on new starts, so make sure you've got as little baggage as possible.

MAGENTA IS PANTONE'S COLOUR OF THE YEAR FOR 2023. AND WHILE THIS **DEEP RED SHADE MAY** BE THE LATEST WORD IN FASHION, IT ALSO HAS A POWERFUL HISTORICAL LINK WITH LANZAROTE THAT SURVIVES TO THIS DAY. Last December, unveiling its colour of the year for 2023, Pantone announced "an unconventional shade for an unconventional time: a new vision: Viva Magenta."! Magenta is a crimson red tone with enough blue to make it straddle the border with purple shades.

According to Pantone, it's "vibrating with vim and vigor, a shade rooted in nature descending from the red family demonstrating a new signal of strength."

And the nature that this colour descends from is located precisely here on Lanzarote, in the cactus fields of Guatiza and Mala.

Look closely at one of the cactus lobes and you may see a small whitish, silky lump - the cocoon of the cochineal beetle. Pinch it between your fingers and they'll be stained with a vivid, pure redthe origin of magenta.

Cochineal was used to produce rich, deep fuchsia colours on which the artificial magenta dye was based (the colour is named after a French battle), and cochineal was one of Lanzarote's main exports in the past, used to colour fabrics and foods. It's long been overtaken by artificial dyes, but you'll still find designers and crafters using natural cochineal products for gorgeously-tinted items of clothing.

You'll also see magenta in the stunning displays of bougainvillea flowers that climb over walls and trellises in the island's gardens, and it's a colour that is often found in other tropical and subtropical flowers that thrive here.

It's a colour that's stimulating and calming at the same time, a bold statement and a comfort. And there's no better time than this year to make magenta a part of your interior decor.

The quality of volcanic basalt around Guatiza and Mala is the reason why this area is home to most of the abandoned quarries on the island. The most famous of these is the Cactus Garden, which César Manrique situated in an old quarry overlooked by a windmill.

But it's the stone of Montaña Tinamala, just south of Guatiza, that has the most spectacular quarries. The

warm, reddish-coloured basalt from this area can be seen in the Cabildo building, at the airport and in some of the older hotels on the island.

The busiest years of the quarry were between 1955 and 1965, when owner Isaías Fernández contracted the electrician Jesús Soto to assemble a machine that made cutting the stone much easier and more precise.

It was while visiting the quarry that Soto's motorbike broke down, and he hitched a lift back to Arrecife with a Cabildo worker, Luis Morales, who had been overseeing roadworks nearby. The two men got to know each other, and Morales recommended Soto to the Cabildo's President for a new project to illuminate

the Cueva de los Verdes for a visit by archaeologists.

That project marked the birth of modern Lanzarote's tourism - the first of seven amazing tourist centres that would see the island's most famous son, César Manrique, invited back to transform his home.

The quarry, however, has been almost forgotten, but

head up the dirt path just behind the Cepsa garage at the turn off to Guatiza and you'll soon find yourself near the quarries. It's easy to park and walk a short distance further up.

Once there you'll see an amazing site - a large, regularly shaped pit sunk into the ground with regular, straight lines running across its walls. These show where the stone was sawn out of

the quarry, and you can still see some of the abandoned machinery in the quarry itself.

This dramatic place was used as the setting for a Swedish production of the opera Aida in the 1980s, and it was also once proposed as the site of a theme



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Outside-in

LANZAROTE LIVING IS WHERE OUTDOORS MEETS INDOORS IN A WAY THAT MAY BE NEW AND A LITTLE CONFUSING, BUT IT MAKES PERFECT SENSE.



On an island where rain is scarce and the temperature rarely drops below 15 degrees, outdoor living can take place all year round. While northern Europe is wrapped up warm, insulated and watching frost form on the windows, Canarians are breakfasting outdoors in the sun and fresh breeze.

That's why there are few porches and hallways in the Canaries - those areas where people in northern climes put on, take off and keep their scarves, coats, wellies, umbrellas and all the other things you'll never need here. In cold places, like an airlock in a spaceship, but they're completely unnecessary here.

Instead, you'll find many transitional areas where outdoors and indoors blend. Traditional larger Canarian homes generally have an inner courtyard, which allows enjoyment of the outdoors while maintaining privacy. The pattern is repeated in many apartment blocks or complexes, arranged around shared central pools and gardens.

Then there are balconies – deliberately designed to blend outdoor and indoor living, creating a space where the sun and air can be enjoyed to the maximum.

Nevertheless, there are times when you'll want to shut the outside out and feel the shelter of being indoors, and on the Canaries that will often be in the summer, when fierce heat can become unbearable.

High winds, occasional rain and colder days in winter also mean it's important to be able to shut out the elements when you need to. Professionally fitted doors, windows; new materials and double glazing can all be of huge assistance here.





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César's logos



THE DESIGNS OF CÉSAR MANRIQUE HAVE NOT JUST TRANSFORMED THE ISLAND; THEY HAVE ALSO BEEN KEY IN MARKETING IT, WITH A SERIES OF LOGOS THAT CONTINUE TO DEFINE THE ISLAND'S TOURIST IMAGE.

> The most famous Manrique logo is, without doubt, the "black sun" image that greets every arrival to the airport and continues to be used to market the island internationally. It's a timeless design that was commissioned by the Cabildo in 1992, and cannot be used without their permission.

The logo is clearly influenced by the one that the Catalan artist Joan Miró created for Spain's tourist board nine vears earlier, using the same red, black and yellow colour scheme that reflects the flag of Spain. However, Manrique's logo adds vivid red rays radiating from a volcanic black circle, and a crescent moon is also clearly visible.

The nature-loving Manrique also could not resist adding a splash of green to the logo - the island's name appears entirely in the colour.

Miró's logo was hugely successful and led to several other countries adopting new logos for their tourist boards. But Spain and Lanzarote have remained faithful to these iconic images, whose power is demonstrated by the fact that they are still used by the tourist boards, and have not been changed or updated for decades.

Another famous logo of Manrique's is the monograph that became the logo of his foundation at Tahiche. Consisting of the artist's initials in red and black, with clear echoes of the island's volcanoes and sun, it's a simple, devastatingly effective design.

Manrique also created images for each of the island's seven cultural and artistic centres (CACTs), the most famous of which is probably the Devil of Timanfaya. This was created as a joke by Manrique about the volcanic heartland of the island's resemblance to a fiery hellscape, but it has taken on a life of its own and has even resulted in a false "legend" being invented and widely spread about a mysterious devil that appeared during the eruptions in the 18th century.

Then there is the crab of Jameos del Agua, referring to the unique animals that live in the tunnel; and the fish that guides the way to the Mirador del Río. The CACT department itself is also defined an elegant Manrique logo.

In Arrecife, the César Manrique secondary school and the adult-training centre both bear Manrique-designed logos, and the artist was not at all adverse to lending his talents to business, either. Every bottle of wine from the El Grifo bodega bears the griffin logo he created for his friends at the winery; while the Canary Island Car (CICAR) hire car company continues to use a dynamic Manrique-signed logo.

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METAL





HEAD OUT TO THE WINE FIELDS OF LA GERIA LATER THIS MONTH AND YOU'LL SMELL SMOKE IN THE AIR AS WINEGROWERS BURN LAST YEAR'S LEAVES AND BRANCHES, PREPARING EACH VINE FOR THE GROWING SEASON TO COME.

The hard prune that the vines are subjected to can be surprising to newcomers - they are hacked back to stubby stumps that it seems they may never recover from. But recover they do, and in just a few months they'll be growing more vigorously than ever.

Pruning is a vital skill not just for wine growers and farmers. In your garden it's a way of getting rid of dead or unwanted growth, shaping plants the way you want them to grow, and making them enter a new phase of vigorous growth.

And now's the time to do it.

EQUIPMENT

This depends on what you want to prune. A pair of kitchen scissors will be fine for many houseplants, but a good pair of secateurs is something every serious gardener needs. For trees, you may also need a saw.

Outdoors, make sure you wear tough gardener's gloves and, if necessary, further protection against Lanzarote's spiky, serrated plants. Glasses and goggles are also a very good idea.

If you've got lots of garden waste, sort out a container or buy several binbags for it, and plan a trip to your local Punto Limpio (recycling point). Disposal of garden waste in normal rubbish containers is against the law.

FOOD AND WATER

Don't water or fertilise plants before or immediately after pruning. Pruning is damage, and they'll have enough work to do adjusting to the changes. Instead, leave them for a week, lightly watering if necessary, then add fertiliser and give them a good soak.











HOW TO PRUNE

Pruning depends on the plant and what you want from it. If you want vigorous growth and the possibility of fruit later, then a hard prune is generally required. If you just want to shape the plant and remove dead growth, then do so, remembering that this will need to be done fairly frequently.

For new growth, the basic rule is to get to know your plant and understand where new shoots and branches come from. These are often nodes on the stem or branch, and you will have to cut just above them.

The type of plan will also dictate how much pruning you should do. Remember that the more growing shoots, you have, the more effort the plant will have to put into each one. One or two shoots will grow much more vigorously than five or six.

Pruning is a learned skill. You'll get better at it as you get to know your plants, but don't be afraid to look for help online.





THERE ARE SEVERAL GARDEN CENTRES ON LANZAROTE, AND THEY OFFER A VITAL SERVICE FOR THE ISLAND'S GREEN-FINGERED POPULATION.

Getting hold of plants isn't as easy as you might think here. Wild plants are usually strictly protected, with heavy fines for anyone found removing them. There is also a long and exhaustive list of plants that it is prohibited to import to the islands, even if you order seeds or bring cuttings in your luggage. While the chances of being caught are low, the fines are high enough to make anyone think twice.

Taking a cutting is also risky. While many British gardeners see nothing wrong with snipping a sprig here and there back home, it's not well received on an island where plants were many people's livelihood not so long ago. You should always seek permission, or find an online community where members exchange seeds, cutting and plants.

Larger supermarkets often sell seeds and some basic gardening equipment, and you'll often see gardeners hanging around IKEA on a Thursday morning when they put their new plants out, but to get the full range of what's on offer, you need to head to a garden centre, or vivero.

Garden centres are the best places to get reliable, first-hand advice on what to grow and how to grow it in Lanzarote's challenging climate.



FLOWER POWER / DECORANDO

This garden centre in Macher is one of our favourites. Flower Power itself is a charming garden centre with all sorts of plants, flowers and garden supplies on offer. Decorando, a little bit further up the hill, is the ornamental centre, and one of the first stops on the island for anyone interested in beautiful containers and other garden equipment.

Flower Power also offers garden maintenance services, landscaping and much more, in at least three languages.





A well-kept garden centre near the Tahiche/ Arrecife roundabout, this garden centre has a section devoted to indoor plants, ornaments and equipment, and another area devoted to outdoor plants.

VIVERO LAS PALMERAS

Located in wildest Arrecife, along dirt tracks between the hospital and the road to Guime, this large garden centre is on hardly anybody's daily route, but it's a well-stocked place and well worth a visit.

TAHICHE GARDEN

Calle Turquia 1, NAVE 14, Playa Blanca 35580, YAIZA, Lanzarote

This is the garden centre that used to host the monthly Sara car boot sale until a few years ago. Serious gardeners should also know that it is directly opposite the Cabildo's Experimental Farm, an agricultural project where seeds and young plants are often offered at low prices.

EXTRA GARDEN CENTRE

Located just behind the large HiperDino supermarket opposite the airport, this centre has a huge selection of plants and equipment, as well as a famous pond full of terrapins.





SITTING PRETTY FOR 2023

Four straight wins set them on course, but this was halted with a 93rd minute goal against playoff rivals CD Mensajero in a 2-1 defeat. The La Palma side are notoriously good on home soil and made it five wins and a draw in their six home matches.

They will be raring to go when football returns in January with two home games on the bounce: firstly against bottom club Estrella CF on the 8th January, followed by the big derby match against local rivals U.S. Yaiza on the 15th.

To come and see any home match there is no need to book tickets in advance. You simply turn up and pay at the door, adults 8 Euros and Pensioners 6 Euros (2 Euro discount for residents). Children 16 years and under are admitted free of charge.

The club have a great offer on Season Tickets (abonos) for the second half of the campaign. For the eight remaining matches you can buy an adult season ticket for 35 Euros or just 20 Euros for a pensioner. This can be bought on match day, at the club in Arrecife or in the shop in Costa Teguise (details below).

LICENCE TO EXCHANGE

THE **LONG** WAIT **FOR RESIDENTS WITH** UK-**ISSUED LICENCES WHO ARE** PROHIBITED FROM DRIVING IN SPAIN MAY SOON BE OVER, ACCORDING TO THE **BRITISH EMBASSY.**

For seven months, the British Embassy has been negotiating with Spanish authorities to try and get resident British drivers back on the roads. In the meantime, the affected motorists have been constantly asking "Are we nearly there yet?" like bored children in the back seat.

Now it looks as if the destination is in sight. The British Embassy has announced that "legal and political approvals" are now under way that will once again permit drivers to exchange UK-issued licences for Spanish ones. The option of continuing to use a UK licence will only last for six months.

The Embassy has announced " Once the Agreement is finalised and published in the BOE (Spanish state bulletin) you will be able to drive for six months on your valid UK licence, during which time you will need to exchange it for a Spanish one to be able to continue



driving. After that six months, you will no longer be able to drive on your UK licence, but will be able to continue to exchange it for a Spanish one.

To change your UK licence for a Spanish one, you will need to apply at the Tráfico Department in Arrecife (or another island - several Lanzarote drivers found it easier to get appointments in Fuerteventura before the ban).

Part of the driving test will involve a "psychotechnical" test, which can be booked at a centro de reconocimiento de conductores (there is one directly opposite Tráfico, for example). This test sounds daunting, but involves an eye test and a brief "video game" test of reactions. You'll also be asked about your medical history and some health issues, such as heart conditions, may result in a reduced term on your new licence.

The Embassy says that "you can exchange any valid UK car (category B) licence, and we expect that many other licence categories can be exchanged too, including mopeds and motorcycles. Further details of all categories will be available when the agreement is published.

Weather Watch

January

January is Lanzarote's coolest month, although there are still usually plenty of opportunities to get some sunbathing done.

Average daily temperatures are around 22 degrees, but they can drop well into the teens or approach 30. Nights are definitely cooler, and you'll need some warm clothing and even heating if you're in high-lying parts of the island.

It's Lanzarote's rainiest month too, with around four or five days when rainfall can be expected.

But the island is still spectacular. The cool weather makes walking in the country a pleasure, rains can bring a light sprinkling of green to the hillsides and there'll be plumes of smoke and the smell of fires in wine country, as the vines are pruned back hard.

TIDAL TIPS

Every day the sea around Lanzarote rises and falls twice. The island's tides are one of the ancient pulses of the island, and knowledge of them is vital for sailors, surfers and other marine specialists. But you can benefit from a little tidal nous, too.

SAFETY

Swimmers should be aware that at high and low tides there'll usually be an hour or two when the water is "slack", with hardly any movement. But that will be followed by the strongest currents as water rushes out or in. The time midway between high and low tides will see relatively steady currents. If you see water moving fast over a reef, stay clear.

BEACHES

There is less room on beaches at high tide, but you'll often find entry to the water easier, as low tides can expose rocks. Never let children play burying games in wet sand – it can be surprisingly hard to get out.

FISHING

Rising tides are usually best for fishing, as that's when fish like to feed. But high tides are also riskier, so take care that you're in a safe, dry spot -wet rocks mean danger.

EXPLORING

Some places, such as the coves at Papagayo, can be cut off by high tides, and more than a few people have found themselves stranded for a few hours. If you're exploring wild beaches, always check tide times and go when it's low.

As a rule, if you're walking on the wild north coasts of Lanzarote, low, falling tides are the time to go. High tides combined with rough weather can create surprisingly violent conditions.

HIGH AND LOW

The highest and lowest tides occur at Full moons and New moons. First and Last Quarter moons are when there is the least difference between tides. The highest tides of the year occur in mid-September.

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
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
