




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# **Ed's letter**

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## WATER WORRIES



Lanzarote's water situation caused deep concern in August as repeated cuts in the supply affected towns and villages during the hottest time of the year. But despite stopgap measures, the underlying problems facing Lanzarote's water suppliers and consumers are still not being addressed.

Canal Gestión, the private company that provides most of the island's water, and the Lanzarote Water Consortium – a board comprised of politicians – claimed that last month's shortages were due to maximum demand in the island's peak tourist season. This, combined with the damage and repair of a mains pipe serving the north of the island, meant that water reserves were almost exhausted.

Most cuts were experienced in smaller outlying towns and villages, as priority is given to the island's resorts which are the heart of the island's economy, and the capital of Arrecife, where most of the population live.

In mid-August the Cabildo ordered two desalination plants that will produce a further

5,000 square metres of water a day to help deal with the shortages. President Oswaldo Betancort said "This is the only solution to water supply in the short term, and will avoid the unwanted situation of water shortages as well as tackle the absolute neglect of water management on Lanzarote and La Graciosa."

That neglect goes back years, and is the responsibility of successive Cabildo governments. The contract signed with Canal Gestión in 2013 included requirements for increases in water bills, allowing investment, repair and maintenance of the system. But politicians have kept the price of water constant for eight years, fearful that a price rise might lose votes.

Now, a court has ruled that the Consortium

owes around €15 million to Canal Gestión, and it is likely that this will have to be paid for with price increases that could add up to 25% onto water bills

In addition, it has been estimated that around €90 million will be required to repair and update the mains water system on Lanzarote, which currently loses 56% of water produced, mainly to leaks. Canal Gestión, which suffered heavy losses because of the pandemic and the increased energy prices following the Ukraine war, is hardly in a position to make such an investment.

Lanzarote's water problems have been brewing for years, first with the mismanagement and corruption in the public water utility Inalsa, then with a hugely controversial privatization, and subsequently with the neglect and inaction of politicians. Now, it seems the chickens are coming home to roost.









# **LOCAL NEWS**

#### SAVE THE RED TINDERBOX

Ecologists In Action have called for a halt to building works that are taking place between the Monumento al Campesino and La Florida, which they claim are endangering a rare plant that is native to Lanzarote.

Helichrysum monogynum, known as Red Tinderbox, is a small shrub with reddish cotton-like flowers that only exists in three locations in the world, all of which are on Lanzarote.

Ecologists In Action have called for the area where the plant is found to be protected, with the halting of works and exclusion from classification for agricultural use.



#### **ROMAN REMAINS ON LANZAROTE**



Archeologists have discovered evidence of links between the earliest inhabitants of Lanzarote and the Romans.

A site at El Bebedero, near Tiagua, has revealed

headstones and tools made of polished basalt and an almost-complete Roman amphora.

According to Pablo Atoche, head of the team from the University of Las Palmas de Gran Canaria which has been carrying out the excavations, the findings provide important clues to the nature of trade between islanders and the Romans in a time period from the first century BC to the 4th century AD.

Although written accounts show that the Romans knew about the Canaries, evidence of their presence has been limited to a settlement on the Isle of Lobos. This is the first indication that there were closer relations between Lanzarote's natives and the Roman empire.

#### HAVE YOU SEEN THIS MAN?

Police are seeking a man who appeared in newlyreleased security video footage, who may have information on the disappearance of Gary James Shearer, the Scot who went missing in Puerto del Carmen on St Patrick's Day.

Gary was last seen outside Bar 67 on the Avenida de las Playas on the night of 17th March, but despite various searches, no trace of him has been found.

The new photos show a heavy-set man of around 60 years of age, with a dark complexion, greying hair and a tan sports jacket.

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#### **CHARCO JETTIES PROPOSAL**

The Charco de San Ginés is one of Arrecife's picture postcard locations, with dozens of small boats bobbing haphazardly on the lagoon.



However, a new plan, commissioned by the Cabildo and published by Diario de Lanzarote, suggests that a series of jetties could be installed to reduce littering and free the Charco for other uses.

The plan aims to reduce pollution in the Charco, especially after heavy rainfall. Dredging has been ruled out as it may affect seaweed colonies, and there are also no plans to reopen water access to Puerto Naos, which could bring more pollution.

Regulation of the boats on the Charco has been minimal, and many vessels are unauthorized. The study claims that installing jetties will remove the "tangle of ropes", and allow a cleaner, less cluttered Charco to be used for several activities.

#### SÁNCHEZ IN HARÍA

Spain's acting President, Pedro Sánchez, took time out from trying to form a new Spanish government to spend a few days on Lanzarote last month.

Sánchez and his family stayed at the "King's House" in Costa Teguise, as he has done on previous vacations to Lanzarote.

During his visit he was seen at the Saturday market in Haría, with the well-known Spanish film director Alejandro Amenábar (director of acclaimed films such as The Others, *Mar Adentro* 



and Abre Los Ojos), who was also holidaying on the island.

#### LANZA FEELS THE HEAT

Lanzarote suffered an intense heatwave in August, which reached a peak on Saturday 12th, with temperatures over 40 degrees registered in some parts of the island.

A red alert for heat was issued for the Saturday, and outdoor daytime activities were cancelled. No victims of the heatwave have been reported, although a 40-year-old tourist was believed to have died of heatstroke while exercising in the south of Fuerteventura.

#### **KENNEDY IS SPAIN'S CHAMPION**

Kennedy Denby became the fastest female 400 metres swimmer in Spain last month, winning Gold at the national championships in Malaga.

A nail-biting final saw Kennedy in second place for almost all of the race, before a final surge saw her win by fractions of a second.

It's an astonishing achievement for the swimmer from Costa



Teguise's Nadamas club, but no surprise to islanders who have seen her smashing record after record.

#### TO LOS DOLORES!

Lanzarote's biggest fiesta takes place at Tinajo and Mancha Blanca this month, as the island celebrates its only official miracle - the appearance of the Virgin Mary to a young 18th century shepherd girl, which prompted the building of the lovely church at Mancha Blanca.

On 9th September, that church will be the destination for thousands of islanders, many of whom will make the pilgrimage (Romeria)





on foot, wearing traditional dress and celebrating on the way.

One week later, the immensely popular Colombian singer Juanes will put on his famous Camisa Negra and perform a big concert on the night of the 16th. Juanes is the biggest performer to appear on Lanzarote for several years, and is also likely to attract huge crowds.


If you plan to go to either weekend event, check road closures carefully and look into the bus services that are laid on from larger towns on the island. And don't forget to wear traditional clothes for the Romería!

#### **ALERTCOPS**

The British Embassy has recommended the use of Alertcops, a smartphone app that puts you directly in touch with police and security forces in Spain.

Alertcops is a police and Guardia Civil app that allows you to report crimes, missing



persons and other matters directly to the forces involved. To use it, register, open the app and press the specific alert button in its icon menu. This way your position will reach the nearest control center.

You can send images and videos, indicate if the alert has happened to you or you have witnessed it. Your position and your data will be sent to the State Security Forces and Corps. More info: https://alertcops. ses.mir.es/publico/alertcops/en/



#### LICENCE DEADLINE EXPIRES

If you were resident in Spain before 16th March this year, you will no longer be able to drive on a UK-issued licence from 16th September, and must exchange your UK licence for a Spanish one as soon as possible.

Tourists and short-term visitors will be able to use UK licences, and residents who registered after March have six months from the date of registration to exchange their licences.

The Spanish government has confirmed that over-70s with expired licences can exchange their licence on the condition that the licence expired after they became resident in Spain.

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# "MAINTAIN AND IMPROVE"

Teguise's new Mayor, Olivia Duque, has 12 years of experience as a councillor at Teguise Ayuntamiento. During her time as Culture Councillor, she oversaw initiatives such as the Pirate museum, the Noche Blanca and the Timple Museum.

In May's elections, her party colleague in the Coalición Canaria, Oswaldo Betancort, stood down as Teguise Mayor in order to present himself as candidate for the presidency of the Cabildo. This allowed Duque to stand as Mayor.

Although the Socialists won most votes in the election, an agreement between the Coalición Canaria, the PP and Vox has permitted the CC to maintain control of Teguise council. We spoke to the new Mayor at the council office in Costa Teguise last month.

#### Congratulations on assuming the Mayorship. You're the first woman to do so in Teguise, aren't you?

Yes. Since Astrid Pérez stood down in Arrecife, I'm also the only female Mayor on Lanzarote. I like to say I'm the best Mayoress on the island!

#### Was becoming Mayor ambition of yours?

Not really. I just wanted to continue to do my job well and it made sense.

#### You've been criticised for accepting the support of the far-right Vox party in order to govern, giving it its first real influence on Lanzarote. What do you say to that?

I'm not a person who bans or vetos. I believe strongly in pluralism and representing as many voters as possible, and I'm well aware that many people in Teguise aren't seeing their votes reflected in the council. But at this local level, what we do is more to do with people than party politics. Ginés, the Vox councillor, is





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a person who has understood that the municipality must improve, and has chosen to join that project.

You can't do anything without stability. We no longer govern with a majority, but I hope we can maintain this stability.

#### What are your priorities for the next four years?

Our main goals are to maintain and improve what we've got, rather than take on any big projects. Currently, the only large project planned is the Sports pavilion in Costa Teguise.

There's a 15 million Euro cleaning contract coming into effect in September, and we want to make sure that that helps to improve our towns and the resort of Costa Teguise.

#### What things outside your control would you like to see change?

Housing is one. Building is up to the Canarian Government, and all we can do is offer land for projects,

which we've already done. We have to look at the situation, and perhaps consider aspects such as controlling holiday rentals, but it's important that people can come and find somewhere to live in Teguise, and that it is affordable.

Public transport is another. It's increasingly important for tourism, as well as for local residents, and areas like Teguise, and the smaller towns such as El Mojón, Teseguite also require a better service.

#### Unlike the last four years, you now have party colleagues from the Coalición Canaria in charge of the Cabildo and the Canarian government. Do you think this will mean Teguise will get more attention?

Yes. We're the biggest municipality on Lanzarote, with the secondhighest population, and I'm confident we'll get much more of the things we want.

Is the Food Fair an example of that? Teguise complained



#### bitterly when last administration removed it from Teguise last year.

Yes. It'll return to La Villa de Teguise, I think in November.

You've been in charge of commerce for a while. How do you see that developing? What has been the response to the decision to remove market stalls from the old town?

The Sunday market remains popular, but more tourists are visiting us during the week these days, too. That means several shops and restaurants are deciding to open in the week.

We changed the market because we wanted to let people see the historical part of the town better, to enjoy one of the most beautiful towns in Spain. Nevertheless, we have taken the decision to extend stalls to some areas where it doesn't interfere with the charm of the town.



# **ROCK OF AGES**

small landslide on the beaches of Papagayo last month did not, fortunately, injure anyone, but it highlights the nature of Lanzarote's geological make-up.



The landslide occurred near the campsite at Playa de Papagayo, with several large rocks tumbling onto an area where witnesses claimed that people had been seen just previously. However, emergency services and a council digger confirmed that no one had been injured in the rock fall.

Landslides on Lanzarote are extremely rare, and there are no records of anyone being injured by a naturally-occurring event. However, erosion is a constant process on all of the Canary Islands, and landslides are one of the natural results of this.

A visit to the western island of La Gomera highlights the issue. This western island is basically an ancient volcano that is gradually crumbling into the sea. Almost all the roads wind between steep crags, and local authorities are continuously clearing small rockslides from the highways. On Lanzarote, you can sometimes see similar small rockfalls on the bendy LZ 10 road leading down to Haría or the LZ 207 to Tabayesco.

On Lanzarote, the areas where erosion is happening most noticeably are the oldest rock formations, such as the cliffs of Famara and the Ajache mountains near Playa Blanca. This is because they are largely made of sedimentary rock

that has been raised from the seabed, which is naturally more crumbly than the basalt that forms the more recent volcanoes. In the Ajache mountains, you can even find fossils and shells

from ancient beaches that are now hundreds of feet above sea level.

But erosion affects volcanic rocks

too. A recent example is the road near Los Hervideros, which has been closed to traffic for several years since a sinkhole appeared, caused by the endless pounding of the waves.

The Famara cliffs, ancient and crumbling.

On Lanzarote, a landslide is

probably one of the last things you have to worry about, but to be absolutely safe it's a good idea to avoid steep rocky areas during or immediately after heavy rainfall. It's also wise not to clamber on rocks

- the only example of a serious injury we know of occurred when a tourist climbed an artificial wall in Costa Teguise, dislodging a boulder

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The stunning beaches Papagayo are usually accessed by car, but discovering them on foot will give you a much better idea of this mind-blowingly beautiful part of the island, and save you paying the entrance fee, too!

The starting point for this walk is the Playa de las Coloradas, the black sand beach in front of the Sandos Papagayo Hotel. There's plenty of parking around here, or you can catch the Playa Blanca circular bus to the Las Coloradas stop and walk down.

Alternately, the official path starts behind the hotel. It's signposted and is just off Calle Las Palmeras on the road to the hotel.

From the beach, face the sea and head left. You'll immediately need to scramble up a small rise at the end of the beach, where you'll find yourself on the clifftop.

Whichever route you take, you'll reach the first beach, Playa de las Mujeres, after about 500 metres. Descend to the beach past the remains of an ancient fortification.

If you want, and only if the tide is low and the sea calm, you can scramble around here to explore the Cueva de Agua (Water Cave). It's a small cave with a natural central column, and great for photos, but take care on slippery rocks (you may find it easier to swim or wade round).

Carry on along Playa de las Mujeres, Papagayo's longest beach at 400 metres. There are a couple of coves hidden at the far end, but if you do explore them you'll have to go back to the beach to climb to the clifftop again.

Another 500 metres on you'll go down to Playa del Pozo, passing one of the most important archeological sites on the island to your right.

Terrain: Sandy tracks with a little light scrambling over rocks if you want.

Equipment: Sun protection, water, snacks, swimming costume. We'd recommend a good pair of trainers that can be removed to enjoy walking barefoot or wading.

This is where the French conquistadores who first put ashore on these beaches in 1402 built a settlement and sunk the storage

Playa del Pozo is a large beach that's fairly far from the carparks. This means it's often quieter, and it's also the most popular naturist beach at Papagayo. At the end of the beach, you can climb back up the cliff or scramble over rocks at low tide, again taking care. This will reveal two lovely little coves.

The next beach is Playa de la Cera, small and almost always filled with tourists. It's a stunning beach, usually with several sightseeing boats bobbing offshore.

Carrying on, you can climb up to the headland and enjoy the Mirador de Papagayo, located just along from two beach bars, or chiringuitos, where you can stop for a drink or meal if you like.

The next beach is Playa de Papagayo itself, always popular and protected by a natural reef that makes bathing safe even when waves are pounding other beaches. Although "papagayo" means parrot, it's fairly certain that the beach is named after the colourful parrotfish that inhabit the reef.

From here you can explore the rest of the headland, and Lanzarote's southernmost tip, but apart from the amazing views, there isn't much else to see apart from cliff edges and scrubby desert.

It's definitely worth seeing Playa Caleta del Congrio, though. This is Papagayo's "forgotten beach", tucked away on the opposite side of the headland to Playa de Papagayo. It's always less crowded than the other beaches and is another favourite for naturists.

From here it's just a matter of heading back, pausing to bathe, relax and take all the time you want along this beautiful chain of beaches.

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# At the Hispano Británico, your children can truly aspire to greatness.



Anny Weng pulverises the world record for subjects taken with  $A^*$ , or grade 9 grades this year.

In their dreams - children think that they can become rich and famous by becoming a star of stage, on the Internet, or on the football field, but this invariably remains - in their dreams.

Whilst it is almost impossible for the ordinary youngster to become a world class sports person, it is relatively easy to become a top scientist. All you need is the right type of education.

You need a degree from one of the top Science universities around the world:

In spite of what you might read in the published rankings of the top universities, according to UCAS statistics, there are just three universities which will **only** accept students with an ability of grade A\* in their Science course subject - and they are all in England. Some twelve universities in the world will **only** accept students with a grade A ability in their Science course subject and they are all in England. Only five universities in the world will **only** accept students with a grade B ability in their Science course subject and all bar one are in England.

If each of these 20 universities If each of these 20 universities accept on average just 100 students on their course, then only 2,000 students per year will start in a university where everyone has at least a grade B ability in that Science subject. These will all have the possibility later on in life to access the 61,000,000 acreer. €1,000,000pa career.

With systems of basic education of just ten years and a broad subject based baccalaureate, children from schools in the US, Europe and other developed countries, simply cannot have the acquired knowledge in the course subject to be able to access these universities. No student from the US, or European systems of education has accessed a first degree Science course at Cambridge university in the past three years. The statistics are public - read them for yourselves.

Of the University entrants at the Hispano Británico this year, 66% have obtained at least a grade B in a Science subject.

In our experience, to obtain a grade B in a subject at A Level, one has to have an A\*. grade 9, or a minimum grade 8 in the subject at GCSE.



Lara Matuk also passes 17 subjects with grades A\*-B.

According to Ofqual statistics, the average number of GCSE subjects taken by sixteen year old students in Britain in 2022 was eight, with only 500 students sitting 12 or more subjects. Of these 500, only 13 obtained grade 9s in all subjects taken.

In 2022, our Daniela Sánchez Pla passed 17 subjects at GCSE, of which 13 were A\*, or grade 9. She was just 14 years of age. This year, Anny Weng has passed 17 subjects, 16 of which were at A\*, or grade 9.

Over the years, the Hispano Británico has attracted some of the most outstanding teachers, who work to a unique variant of the British system of education. It produces results that are second to none.



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

# A SECOND CHANCE FOR Kasita

Did you know that SARA - Lanzarote's largest dog and cat sanctuary - has a permanent foster scheme (PAP) to help support difficult-to-place cats and dogs in new homes? Whether it is because of age, disability or special needs, some dogs and cats find it difficult to be adopted.

That's why SARA offers a scheme that provides free healthcare for a select number of animals, to ensure that they spend their final years in a loving home.

A case in point is Rosita, who has such a big personality for a little dog. Found abandoned by a roadside and in a terrible state, she was brought to SARA where she was nursed back to health.

Rosita's teeth were so rotten from neglect that all but four had to be removed. The sanctuary predicted her age to be around 11 years old. She's an 'abuelita' (Spanish for Granny) with attitude - but also with a lot of love to still give.

An instant hit with the staff and volunteers at SARA, Rosita lived in the veterinary office with all the newly-arrived cats at the shelter. Amazingly, she was completely

indifferent to them - and even shared her bed with one once!

That's how she caught our eye. We had already rescued a number of street cats and wanted to introduce a dog that wouldn't upset them. It can vary how long it takes for any animal to acclimatise to a new home, but luckily for us, Rosita fitted right in and has blossomed into a confident and happy little dog.

As with other animals on the PAP scheme, Rosita does have some special needs. She is almost blind and needs to have her eyes cleaned at least once a day. She is very patient and lets us care for her. She adores her walks around The Charco in Arrecife and makes friends wherever she goes.

It is incredibly rewarding to give one of these special animals a forever home, especially those in their twilight years. The sanctuary provides excellent support and you never have to worry about large veterinary expenses. 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

The most obvious answer is the climate. Here in the sub-tropics, the temperature hardly ever falls below 10 degrees Celsius, even in the coldest months of the year, and there are several hours of daylight all year round.



The more you read about recommended diets for longer, healthier life, the more you suspect that Lanzarote could be specially designed for healthy eating.



#### **DEEP TREATMENT**



#### **GET ORGANISED!**

One of the most important aspects of living on Lanzarote is health coverage. For tourists it's a matter of ensuring that you have the GHIC or EHIC health card which guarantees free medical emergency coverage abroad. Details are available at www.gov.uk.

These cards only cover emergencies, though,

there are certain health costs they do not cover, and repatriation costs are not included. That's why the British Home Office also recommends strongly that travellers take out a private health insurance policy.

For foreign residents on the island, residency applications require evidence of health coverage. This can be private insurance, or in the case of those working legally on the island, registration





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with social security that allows you to access a health card.

There are different agreements for the self-employed and retired, and it is also possible to pay voluntarily into the social security system with the convenio especial. If you're worried about your healthcare situation, we'd strongly advise getting professional help from a gestor.

#### **GET CHECKED UP!**

There's a sense of starting anew in September, as the long summer holidays end and work gets back to norma. That means it's a good time to give yourself a check-up to make sure everything's in working order.

Roughly speaking, you should get a check-up once a year if you're over the age of 50, and once every three years before that, but this will depend on your overall state of health in the first place.

You can request a check-up from your doctor, who will decide what tests need to be taken and consult with you afterwards. If you're in good shape, some tests may not be deemed necessary.

Opticians and dentists are a separate matter, and are not covered by the Canarian health services.

Regular check-ups for both your eyes and dental health are recommended.

#### **GET A PLAN!**

September is the perfect time to make a fitness plan. This is the time of year when things tend to settle down into a daily routine, and you'll know when you have regular free slots to fit your work-out into.

This is important – the first goal of getting fit should

be making a plan and sticking to it. Whether it's two or seven times a week, whether it's a brisk stroll or a 5K run, the first test will be getting it done.

Some things can help - joining up with a friend or two will give you more motivation and add a social element to the physical work; writing lists and ticking them off is far more effective than you might think, and even getting a dog guarantees regular exercise.

While planning, remember that clocks go back at the end of October, giving you less light in the evening and more in the morning.

#### **GET SIGNED UP!**

September is also the start of many organised sporting and fitness activities on Lanzarote. Don't leave signing up to a gym until after Christmas - if you do it now, you'll face the festive season in a lot better shape.

Private fitness instructors will also be taking on new clients around this time, and if you need a little expert guidance, now's the time to get it.

For residents and long-term visitors, it's always worth checking what's on at local sports and leisure centres, or visiting the Deportes section of your local town hall. You'll find a wealth of activities, some of which you may never have suspected of existing.

#### **GET OUTSIDE!**

Let's be honest - how long did you spend outdoors during August's heatwave? Tourists might have braved the heat, but most residents spent the days next to a fan or hunting for an air-conditioned building.

September offers mellower, more tolerable weather, the mornings are cool and refreshing, the evenings delightful and seas are at their warmest. It's glorious out there, so make the most of it!

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


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Harmitako

Make the most of fresh tuna with this hearty Basque fisherman's stew.

Any fresh tuna will give good results, and bonito listado (skipjack) can be very cheap at this time of year. Buy the meat already prepared or choose a fish and ask the fishmonger to prepare it in "cuatro lomos sin piel" - you'll end up with four long, meaty skinless tuna steaks.

The other ingredient that may take a little tracking down is pimienta choricera, the red pepper that is used to flavour the famous chorizo sausage. You can buy these peppers dried in many places, soak them and scrape the pulp from the skins, but larger Spar supermarkets stock ready-prepared pulp in jars. If you can't find it, don't worry too much.

#### **METHOD**

First, prepare the tuna, removing any bones, and cutting into 2 cm cubes. Place in fridge.

Peel and chop the potatoes into bite size chunks (about 2cms).

Prepare the sofrito: Chop the onion and carrot finely, chop the pepper into larger pieces. Fry in olive oil until the onion is soft, adding the chopped garlic half-way through.

Add the wine and cook the alcohol off (3 minutes). Halve the tomato and grate flesh into the sofrito. Add pimentón, pimiento, chilli. Cook for 2 minutes then add the potatoes and the fish stock.

Bring to the boil, then simmer until the potatoes are well-cooked (20 mins).

Turn heat off and add the tuna chunks. They will cook in the remaining heat.

Serve after five minutes, garnished with chopped parsley if you like.



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# Fruit fiesta

This is the time of year when fresh fruit is at its very finest on Lanzarote. Here are some of the seasonal fruits that will make your September sing...

#### **MELON**

Watermelons, galias and canteloupes are available, but the favourite melon on the Canaries is probably the piel de sapo (toadskin), named for it's rough, cracked green skin. Press the melon gently

at the bottom end to check ripeness - if it gives a little, it should be fine.

Tip: A ripe melon is glorious, but an unripe one is no fun at all. If you open one, think about making a chilled gazpacho soup with it, blending it with oil, garlic, green pepper, cucumber and a little onion. Refreshment guaranteed!

#### **MANGOS**

There is probably no other fruit as luxurious and delicious as a ripe mango. On the Canaries, you'll find two types on sale. The ones you probably know as mangos are large, green with a reddish blush and confusingly called mangas. Canarian mangos are smaller, yellow and a little more fibrous, but make up for this with intense flavour.

> Tip: Mango, finely chopped with mixed with red onion, red pepper, coriander, chilli and lime juice makes a spectacular Mexican salsa dip to accompany guacamole and tacos.



#### **PARAGUAYOS**

These small flattened peaches are fairly recent arrivals to UK shelves, where they're sold as flat, donut or Chinese peaches. They've long been popular in Spain, though, and that's because they're both delicious and consistent - much less prone to be dry than a normal peach. As with all peaches and nectarines, buy the heavier ones, and use your nose to check for ripeness if you're going to be eating them right away.

Tip: Skinned, blended paraguayos make a fantastic and unique tropical cheesecake.

#### **PLUMS**

Often the cheapest soft fruit at this time of year, plums are at their sweetest and aren't always available all year round, so make the most of them. There are several varieties, but the deep purple ciruelas rojas are the ones you'll probably be most used, to, while the delicate green Reina Claudias (greengages) are known as the sweetest.

Tip: If plums are cheap, load up and make plum jam. Or add them to gin with sugar to make a sweeter variation of sloe gin.

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


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
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## **TAXING TIMES**



Late summer is a popular time for local councils to open their property tax payment schedules, so here's a brief beginners' guide to IBI.

A reader recently contacted us to ask about the schedule for IBI payments, worried that they may incur fines for not paying on time. So here's a brief guide to the local property tax.

IBI stands for Impuesto de Bienes Inmuebles, which means "tax on immovable assets", or more simply, property tax. It's a tax that is set and collected by your local town council (Ayuntamiento), and is used for local maintenance and infrastructure such as roads, street lighting etc.

Its level depends on the value of your property assessed by the Land Registry office. After complaints from many owners who were negatively affected by high valuations that were made before the financial crisis in 2008, assessments take place more regularly nowadays.

Each council may adopt slightly different rules for the IBI, with several offering discounts for listed buildings, energy-efficient homes and many other factors. You'll find that some rarely change the IBI from year-to-year, while others may even reduce it for electoral advantage.

In any case, it's good to know what you're liable to pay. Householders should receive a letter in the post informing of their IBI bill, but non-delivery is not a defence for not paying. To avoid incurring late payment penalties that can range from 5% to 20%, many householders set up a direct debit with the bank.

The tax may be demanded at different times depending on where you live, although late summer and autumn is favoured by many councils. For example, Yaiza's period for paying this year's IBI demands runs from August to 6th November.

If you have doubts about the payment times, and can't find information online, you should ask at the Oficina de Recaudación of your local Ayuntamiento, which can also offer assistance with direct debit payments.

This is also the sort of thing that a decent gestor or administrator should be able to handle, saving you time, worry and a crash course in Spanish tax vocabulary.



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## **EES AND ETIAS**



The introduction of the EU's new EES and ETIAS schemes is just around the corner. Here's what you'll need to know.

Both schemes will apply to all non-EU residents visiting the Schengen area. Since Brexit, UK citizens also fall under this category, although the scheme itself has nothing to do with Brexit. It is instead intended to tighten up on security and irregular immigration into the EU.

The first stage will be the introduction of the EES (Entry Exit System). This will require

biometric information (facial scans and fingerprints) to be checked at borders. Some passports contain encoded information on their chips, but a UK passport, for example, does not contain fingerprint info, meaning prints may be

taken on entry.

The ultimate aim is to speed up the system, removing the need for passport stamping, and allowing authorities to monitor the length of time people stay within the Schengen zone. This aspect could mean stricter enforcement of the rules on UK nationals who have been limited to spending 90 days in their EU second homes since Brexit.

The ETIAS (European Travel Information and Authorisation System) will come into operation several months after EES, and will require a charge of €7 for all visitors to the Schengen zone. Visitors will also have to fill in a short online form before their visit. The ETIAS will last for three years.

Many details of the schemes are still uncertain: for example, whether British nationals who are resident in Spain will be able to use their TIE card to avoid the requirements.

Even the time when the schemes will come into force has not been finalised, although a deadline of 2024 has been established.

This uncertainty has led to many wild predictions of border delays and online scams, but at the moment we simply can't say what will happen. But EES/ETIAS are almost certainly coming, and you have been warned.



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Lanzarote is defined by colour in a way that few other places in the world are.


When the French mercenary Jean de Bethancort landed on the shores of Papagayo to claim Lanzarote for the Spanish crown in 1402, he was looking for one thing. Bethencort owned dyeing

works in France, and part of his deal with Spain gave him control over the island's supply of orchilla lichen.

Orchilla was sought-after for the rich purple shades it gave to clothing, and the industry lasted for hundreds of years until artificial dyes replaced it. The lichen now grows undisturbed on the Famara cliffs, but some artisans still use it to create gorgeous fabrics.

industry defined the appearance of the island. Glasswort is a low-growing plant that is burnt to produce lime ash - a vital ingredient in soaps and white paint. This provided a cheap way of whitewashing houses, protecting them against the elements, reflecting the heat and creating all those little sugar cube buildings that can still be seen on the island.





Whitewash is useful, but it isn't waterproof. So the boats used by the fishermen who sailed to the rich banks off the African coast were usually painted in weatherproof paint that came in nautical shades of blue and green. Leftover paint was used to protect and decorate the window frames, shutters and doorways of houses in the fishermen's neighbourhoods, explaining the current appearance of many of the island's ports and seaside villages.

If Lanzarote was conquered for purple and later made it's living from white, another colour - brilliant red - soon

became it's most important product. The cochineal beetle is a small insect that lives on the lobes of the nopal cacti that arrived on Lanzarote from the Americas.

You can still see the white larvae of the beetles on cacti in Mala and Guatiza crush one with your finger and you'll release a deep, blood red pigment which was used as the main red food colouring for decades.

Once again, the cochineal industry has fallen victim to artificial pigments, but craftspeople still dye clothes with the vivid dried powder. They also use skins from the sweet, delicious onions that were once the island's main crop which produce a gorgeous golden yellow colour.

That golden yellow became the selling point of the island in the 1970s and 80s. as brochures showing the beaches of Puerto del Carmen attracted millions of tourists to a tiny island in the Atlantic Ocean. And, of course, another yellow - that glowing ball of fire in the sky called the sun, is such a vital element of the Canaries that it is part of their flag.

Finally, of course, there is black. Timanfaya is actually a beautiful blend of subtle volcanic colours - cobalt blues, ferric reds and sulphurous vellows - but the underlying shade is the deep black of volcanic basalt. Head to one of Lanzarote's black sand beaches, watch the white surf wet the jet-black sand and you'll see the most deeply satisfying, profound black.

Lichen


It's also common for people to stretch out on their sofa for a nap or siesta, and if this is something you like to do, you'll need a sofa large enough to do it comfortably.





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WORKING WITH

Poorly planned lighting can ruin the potential of a beautiful room. Lighting can make or break a space and it should be very top of the list when redesigning a room.



After the bedroom, the living room is the most-used space in our homes, which is why it's important to make it a comfortable and inviting space.

If your living room relies on ceiling lights alone, why not enhance the space with new light sources such as floor lamps, candles, and table lamps? Including multiple light sources allows you to adjust the mood of the room at a moment's notice.

#### LAYERS OF LIGHT

Diversify your living room lighting by adding bookshelf downlighters, standing floor lamps, and candles. Ceiling lights will illuminate the entire room, but remember that they can also

take away the cosiness, removing personality.

Turning on a combination of bookshelf lamps and floor lamps will usher in a relaxed and ambient feel, perfect at night when you're ready to relax.

#### FOCUS POINTS

Directional lighting can be used to draw attention to particular aspects of the room such as a leather armchair or display cabinet, leaving the surroundings dim.

Backlighting is often used to draw attention to a suspended object such as a flat screen television or artwork frame, pulling your eyes towards it and turning it into a feature piece.

#### **ULTIMATE CONTROL**

Dimming light switches allows you to control the brightness of light fixtures rather than simply turning them on or off. They can be dimmed just enough to bring warm lighting to the room from the ceiling down without drawing all the attention to it.

Brighter white lights work better in functional spaces such as the kitchen, a home office, or the washing room. Some studies have shown that cooler lights keep the brain stimulated and promote productivity -

which is why most offices and hospitals use them.

Warm light has the opposite effect and is best suited to our relaxing spots such as the living room, bedrooms, and conservatories.

In recent years, new tablets and most operating systems also come with a "warm light" feature which will dim the blue light of the LED screen at a certain time in the evening, reducing the strain on your eyes and allowing the brain to "switch off".

the invitation to César Manrique to return home and transform the island.

But Manrique and Soto could never have done it alone. A 2015 documentary titled Las Manos pays tribute to the local craftsmen they hired to actually create the centres with their bare hands, and it's a tribute to their skill that much of their work remains visible and operational

That tradition continues on the island, and the industrial zones that can be found around the island will hear a symphony of hammering, grinding and machinery, as items are prepared for every corner of the island.

The Cepal Group, for example, employ more than 100 workers in their three sub-companies Estructuras Cepal, Alustudio (aluminium and metal) y Managlass (glass). In 15 years, they have become one of the most trusted and indemand companies on the island, and have worked on some of the island's most impressive projects during that time.

They're just one of several examples of reliable, skilled and committed service in the sector. On an island this small, word gets around fast and "cowboys" don't last too long.

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# Pot heads

CONTAINER GARDENING IS PERFECT FOR AN ISLAND WHERE MANY HOMES HAVE LIMITED SPACE, SOIL ISN'T ALWAYS OF THE BEST QUALITY, AND WEATHER CONDITIONS CAN REQUIRE MOBILITY.

And the island's garden centres reflect that, with a huge range of containers of all shapes and sizes. Here are few tips to help you get your pots up and running.

#### The containers

Terracotta pots are the classic container, but take into account that they are porous. This helps drainage in cooler climates, but in hot weather it will also dry your plants out faster. You'll need to step up your watering regime, or choose glazed pots that hold moisture more effectively. If they're going to be in the sun, light colours are preferable, to reflect sunlight and prevent soil heating up.

Window boxes are perfect for planting colourful flowers, herbs, and other edible plants. They're available in many styles, but on





Lanzarote you'll need to check for wind and sun. South-facing boxes will usually be protected from wind, but will get the full impact of the sun all day.

Hanging baskets are popular in Lanzarote, but you need to plan your watering regime carefully, as they may be difficult to reach and are liable to leak water onto anything below. On Lanzarote they should also be kept well out of the wind.

Plastic pots are cheap and lightweight and hold moisture well, but they're not usually very pretty. Metal planters are also useful and more attractive, but metal heats up a lot in direct sunlight.

Grow bags are best for plants with shallow roots. They can be disguised in larger containers, but they're only really a serious option for vegetable growers who aren't that worried about aesthetics

#### Preparing your containers

First choose the right-sized container for the plant you need. Roughly, a growing plant requires at least two-thirds more space than it occupies.

Then choose where you're going to place your containers. This will be easier once you've observed how the sun moves across your outdoor space, the shade available and, importantly, areas where draughts and breezes are frequent. Don't worry too much if you don't get it exactly right -





containers are portable.

Buy some good potting soil - tierra preparada (prepared soil) is available from local garden centres, as well as several compost blends. Don't be afraid to add more nutrients depending on what your plants require.

#### Thriller, filler, spiller

When combining several plants in one large container, start by selecting a "thriller" - a tall, bold plant like a geranium. Next, choose your "filler"—this should be a medium-height, bushy plant to fill out the arrangement, such as verbena, salvia, or lantana. Finally, add a "spiller," which should cascade over the edge of the container. Spiller options include creeping zinnia, petunia, and sweet potato vine.

#### Go<sub>3D</sub>

Containers offer one advantage that beds cannot compete with – mobility. You can place them at any height, move them around and quickly get a real sense of depth and dynamism.

Think about arranging pots in tiers, or even one above the other. Use larger plants to shelter smaller ones, and save water by placing plants where they'll get moisture that drains from others.

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# Tidal force



LANZAROTE AWAITS THE HIGHEST TIDES OF THE YEAR THIS MONTH, REFLECTING THE IMPORTANCE OF THE ENDLESSLY RISING FALLING **OCEANS** THAT SURROUND OUR ISLAND.

If you've ever holidayed in the Mediterranean, you may have noticed that there are hardly any tides. The mostly-landlocked sea usually rises and falls by around half a metre, which is why you never hear of Italians or Greeks getting stranded by rising tides.

Lanzarote, however, is located in the second-largest ocean in the world - the mighty Atlantic - and there's a lot more water for the moon's gravity to shift. As a result, there's a difference of up to 3 metres between high and low tides, and that's more than enough to make you regret choosing that secluded cove at Papagayo once the tide comes in.

The end of this month will see the highest and lowest tides of the year, as the full moon rises on the 29th after the autumn equinox on the 23rd. In the Canaries, these massive tides are called Las Mareas del Pino (the Pine Tides), as they occur close to the annual Descent of the Virgin of the Pine, one of Gran Canaria's most important religious festivals.

The high tides can be seen best at large, flat beaches such as Los Pocillos or Guacimeta in Playa Honda, where they can form large, shallow tidal pools. Tourists on smaller beaches who are enjoying the late September warmth often find themselves huddling together on a small strip of sand that remains at high tide.

But the high tide always brings an optimistic, buoyant atmosphere to Lanzarote, too. Boats in the marinas and harbours bob merrily, as high as they'll get all year, and everyone knows the tide will leave clean, virgin beaches behind.





The low tides also bring activity. This is the only time of year when parts of the lower seashore are exposed, and that means that shellfish and other creatures are also exposed. As a result, you'll often see locals *marisqueando* (collecting shellfish) at the low tide line. They're usually hunting for lapas – the edible limpets that are a local delicacy, but fishermen also seek soft-shell crabs

for use as bait, and you may see someone heading out with a sharp hook that is used to catch octopus.

This year's tides will not be as high as when the full moon coincides exactly with the equinox, but they will be noticeable, and it's probably not the best day to fall asleep in that isolated cove at Papagayo.

#### WHY ARE FULL MOON TIDES SO HIGH?

Tides are mainly caused by the gravitational pull of the moon, but the sun also has a smaller effect. That means that when the sun, moon and earth are lined up, solar gravity is added to lunar gravity, creating a stronger pull and higher tides of up to 20%.

That alignment happens during full moons (when the sun is in front of the moon,) and new moons (when it is behind it). When the alignment is precise, you get eclipses.

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#### SHOPPING ONLINE

Living on the Canary Islands means that online shopping is never going to be as fast or easy as it is in large countries.



The obvious problem is distance - we're simply further away from many manufacturers and suppliers, and all items are brought in by sea or air.

The Canaries' status as an EU special economic zone, which means that customs declarations are often required and a different VAT system known as IGIC, applies. Brexit hasn't helped those ordering from the UK, either, as many companies have stopped delivering to the EU due to increased paperwork.

The Canarian Government has tried to ease matters by eliminating IGIC on all online purchases under €150 (which accounts for 75% of purchases) but the situation is still far from ideal, with frequent reports of customers paying customs charges that exceed the price of the goods ordered.

When using the most famous suppliers, such as Amazon, eBay or AliExpress, Canarian purchasers have learned that the first thing to check is shipping policy to the Canaries. Many suppliers do not offer this, and prices may vary among those that do. Then there is still the possibility of customs hold-ups.

The choice of carrier can also be a problem, with some requiring pick-ups at depots on the island rather than assuring home delivery.

As a result of this, companies such as Guanxe, Syniva and Banango (previously known as Canarias Prime) have popped up in the Canaries, each offering simplified shipping and VAT, and relatively rapid delivery.

They're worth checking out if you do a lot of online shopping, but until things are improved overall, online shopping here is still likely to be a hit-and-miss affair.
